## FOR SAFETY, ACADEMIC INTEGRITY AND COMMUNITY REDESIGNING 'SCHOOL'



Many people have asked, "What has changed at Rockway?" The short answer is, "Everything". When it became clear that physical distancing and classroom cohorts would be part of the new school year, we completely redesigned Rockway's **Academic Program**. We focused on: Safety, Academic Integrity, and Community.

After months of planning, we launched a new Academic Plan for Grades 7 & 8 and for Grades 9-12. The plan calls for four terms (Quadmester school year) with instructional blocks of 2.5 hours in the morning and afternoon.

The younger grades stay with their class cohort of 15 or 'bubble' for the entire day. Older students have in-person classes in their cohorts for half the day, and then the option for the other half of the day to study their elected courses online off campus or study them online with a cohort group on campus. Students maintain classroom and cohort seating plans to ensure each has a safe personal space. Each cohort is supervised and supported by a Cohort Counsellor, a newly created role that ensures students have the support they need when doing their online classes.

All Grade 7 & 8 students are assigned a Chromebook to support their studies. Grades 9-12 use their own devices or borrow a Chromebook if necessary. We have increased our internet bandwidth to accommodate expanded online learning, and will be making more investment in this area.

This new academic plan required: course selections by highschool students to be resubmitted; the student timetable to be completely revised; teaching assignments to be changed and professional development increased; and, the hiring of several new personnel.

Guided by the leading public health experts, Rockway also released a **COVID-19 Health Protocol**, which details the many steps we are taking to keep our school community safe:

- numerous facility upgrades such as touchless faucets and improved ventilation
- hand sanitizer, disinfectant wipes and signage throughout the school
- controlled access to the school: students arrive at staggered times at multiple entrances and head directly to class. At other times, entrance to the school is limited to those teaching, working, learning or by appointment. We are not presently hosting any rentals, special events or afterschool activities in the building.

#### **EDUCATING WITHOUT BORDERS IN A GLOBAL PANDEMIC**

It was Rockway's International Program which first alerted us to the potential challenges of COVID-19. Early in the year, when international students started contemplating heading home for March Break 2020, Rockway had to start grappling with 'What if?'.

Fearing the worst, but hoping for the best, we created the first ever Rockway Summer HomeStay program. This gave international students the option of remaining in Canada for the summer if they planned to continue their studies with us this fall. Several chose to do this.

As the pandemic swept around the world, and borders closed and flights were halted, our attention shifted to students yet to arrive in Canada. We worked tirelessly with families and government authorities throughout the summer to ensure the appropriate paperwork was in place.

As school started, fourteen students were still awaiting visas, and two had been denied entry due to a bureaucratic requirement of which we had not been notified.

Presently, Rockway continues to advocate on behalf of international students awaiting visas; most have deferred their studies to the second term, hopeful they can join us in November. Another two have opted to defer to next year.

In the short-term, we have also prepared a submission for consideration to be added to the approved list of schools, which border security refers to when monitoring access to Canada.

In the long-term, we continue to evaluate the COVID-19 situation and will evaluate what our International Program may look like next year, and beyond.

\*\*For over 40 years, international students have been an important part of Rockway's community. We are grateful for the diversity, global perspective, and broader awareness they bring to our school, and for the opportunity to engage with them in Canadian culture and Mennonite education. We look forward to continuing this fruitful partnership. \*\*\*

#### ONE ROCKWAY FAMILY'S STORY

"When it came time for my wife and I to choose a high school for our children, we knew we wanted them to be at a school where they would feel safe and nurtured. A school where they would feel part of a meaningful community. A school that actively fosters the values that we want our kids to take into their adult lives. Values like social justice, respect for others, respect for oneself, peace-building, mutual aid, a love of diversity, a desire to explore spirituality.

We wanted them to make deep friendships that they would take with them beyond graduation. We wanted them to become self-aware, compassionate contributors to a global world. And we wanted them to come home from school every day feeling both happy and challenged.

No doubt all parents want something like this for their children. But we felt that our kids, especially, needed a school like Rockway. Their early lives, before we adopted them, had been tumultuous. Broken and problematic relationships had been modelled for them. They had been shunted from one temporary home to another. They were hurt and at risk.

Adopting our kids has been a blessing for us. And, I think, for them. But it has also been physically and emotionally exhausting. And it has impacted us financially. Weekly therapy costs have been ongoing. And there have been years where we had to be a single-income family because the time and energy needed to support our children – to help them recover from their early childhood traumas – was overwhelming.

Without tuition assistance, our children would not have been able to attend Rockway. They would not have experienced its extraordinarily nurturing community. They would not have been steeped – at least not as deeply – in the values that I named above. And I don't think they would have come home from school each day feeling both happy and challenged.

But thanks to generous donors, we did receive tuition assistance. And as a result, our children are well on their way to becoming what we hoped for self-aware, compassionate contributors to a global world."

One family's story shows us the difference tuition assistance can make in the life of a child, and to the health of a family. At Rockway, tuition assistance is only possible through donations.



This year, as part of its 75<sup>th</sup> celebrations, Rockway was blessed to receive a grant of \$250,000 from Mennonite Church Eastern Canada for tuition assistance for students from new Canadian MCEC congregations. Inspired by this, we launched a fundraising campaign to light 75 candles. *Each candle represents the average amount for one year of tuition assistance (\$3,600) for a Mennonite student.* 

Before the school closed in March, 5 candles had been lit.

As we return to the classroom and support families dealing with the financial impact of the pandemic, it is time to renew our efforts.


#### **HONOURING ROCKWAY GRADUATES OF 2020**

The Health Protocol emphasizes personal safety. All are asked to wear a facemask at all times, unless eating, outdoors with their class or cohort, or exempted by a medical circumstance. For student cohort or bubble safety, our cafeteria is temporarily closed. Food Services now provide students with snack baskets and lunch options in their classrooms. At lunch or break times, students can also head outside to picnic tables, where signage reminds them to be safe. We also encourage outdoor learning when possible.

Amidst all the plans and protocols, we still find time to **build community** through weekly online pre-recorded chapels, Cohort Connections (fun activities done in cohorts), online clubs, and Student Council.

As you can see, school has radically changed, and we are still adjusting. Thanks to our resilient and caring community, this year, students can feel safe, parents can be confident in our academic integrity, and our community will continue to support each other. After 75 years of faithful education, Rockway remains a strong, vibrant school.

# LOCAL ARTIST CAPTURES ROCKWAY'S 75<sup>TH</sup> YEAR WITH NEEDLE AND THREAD




Kathy Janzen held her first needle and thread as a child of 8 years learning to embroider and hand sew doll clothes and quilt blocks for her church's quilts. She interrupted her sewing vocation with a stint as a primary school teacher for 28 years. In retirement, Kathy has returned to the fabric arts with a passion and especially enjoys all aspects of quilting.

"The 75th Rockway Anniversary Celebration Quilt celebrates both the legacy of community and learning at Rockway. The pixilated Rockway Cross is the focus of the quilt. It represents Rockway's strong mission for learning, character, faith and passion for peace in service to God and creation. Its pixilation recognizes the multitude of ways that each of us have in engaging with and living out this mission. This centre piece is embraced on two sides by a traditional pattern of log cabin blocks, recognizing that such a mission can only be accomplished through the faithfulness of generations of learners and supporters. The colours of the fabrics (blacks, reds, purples and whites) have all been used over the years in various images representing Rockway. The quilt stitching features an apple tree. It evokes thoughts of rootedness, growth and fruitful living, a privileged heritage gained through settlement on Haudenosaunee land. The best response to such a legacy of learning is to live with gratitude toward peace and justice for all."

The quilt is currently hanging in Rockway's Silo as part of our Alumni 75<sup>th</sup> Quilt Exhibition. We will be featuring other quilts from the exhibition online in the months ahead. The 75<sup>th</sup> quilt will be up for auction at Rockway's BIG Night Out 75<sup>th</sup> Fundraising Dinner mini-auction next May.
