In particular, we are watching our 'Chortitza Oak' sapling (not yet big enough to picture here). It was gifted to Rockway and planted last spring on the front grounds in honour of the school's 75th year.

The tiny sapling was sprouted by Nathan Funk from a specimen at Conrad Grebel University College. It descends from and grows in memory of the great oak in Chortitza, Ukraine.

For over 800 years, the oak provided a gathering place and landmark for many, including Mennonites who settled in the Ukraine in the 18th century. It is a reminder of their journeys and trials. Our sapling also represents our deep appreciation for the strength of faith and community that led to the founding of Rockway in 1945, and our recognition of those who continue to learn and grow here and those who continue to support and nurture them.

Spiritual Emphasis Week resilience:

bending, not breaking in the storm

All-school Chapels are a treasured weekly tradition at Rockway, bringing our school together to reflect on bigger questions of faith, spirituality and community. Normally, we would gather in our Assembly Area. This year, we are sharing together via pre-recorded Chapels.

Once-a-year, we host a special focus week: *Spiritual Emphasis Week* that includes three morning Chapels. Echoing Rockway's 2020-2021 overall Chapel theme, Alumna, Susan Schwartzentruber, gave three Chapel addresses and several virtual classroom visits on the timely topic of resilience:

- 1. Peter and a Donkey using the story of Peter the Apostle and a fable about a donkey to raise self-awareness
- 2. Fight/Flight/Freeze It's Normal exploring specific resilience strategies. This coincided with the awareness day, Pink Shirt Day, which challenges bullying.
- 3. Becoming a Forest of Trees finding sources of support and growing a community of resilience

Being able to visit classes virtually enabled Susan to reach more students with helpful, practical resilience-building strategies during this critical time. We also shared these Chapels online with



Alumni, and are sharing all weekly Chapels with families, to help build resilience throughout our community.


In an earlier Chapel, Rockway parent, Laura MacGregor, inspired us to reflect upon the use of language and how it influences/communicates about inclusion.

Through this lens, we chose to edit our 2020-2021
Chapel theme from, 'resilience: strength in *standing* together' to 'resilience: strength in *joining* together.'

This update is reflected in our new community banner, which welcomes people to our school.

Everyone was so much friendlier than I expected!"; Aaron has shown us pictures of his hikes in the hills near Hong Kong, entertains us with fun background screens, and has already challenged Rick to a basketball game when they both get on campus (Editor Note: Rick and Aaron have both arrived safely in Canada. Welcome!). Frank, who has been at Rockway since the beginning of grade nine, has introduced us to his cats, and Jack, who has been here since then too, occasionally has his brother Jerry – also a Rockway student – stroll through the room behind him. Both are able to give valuable advice from a student perspective to the rest of the class, who are new this term. This historic first for Rockway – an international student class happening across time zones – has been fantastic, thanks to the excellent work and phenomenal participation of the students!

Meanwhile on campus, Rockway students are enjoying Cohort Connections and activities led by Student Council. They recently participated in Winter Olympics, a week of outdoor friendly competition, including snowshoeing, potato sack races, sledding... even tug'o'war.

Thanks to donations, each student will receive a personalized robotics car kit and extra pieces. Additional kits will be purchased for Rockway's quadmester 4 Robotics class with fourteen students (only one student is in both the club and the class).

Most of all, after a year of not gathering with Alumni in person, we were able to connect, 'see' some of you, and share our love of Rockway with current students and families. Priceless!










NATIONAL VOLUNTEER WEEK: The Value of ONE, The Power of Many.

Our students have almost completed their third quadmester in this most unusual school year. We are so grateful for our Rockway school, including all Faculty and Staff, for their ongoing leadership and care.

Earlier this year, I made an important announcement: our beloved principal, Ann L. Schultz is retiring, effective December 31, 2021. Naturally, this is sad news for us. We have loved Ann's leadership and thank her for her stellar service over her many (30!) years at Rockway and in particular, for her outstanding leadership over the

Over Ann's years as Principal, student numbers have grown, the budget has stabilized and most importantly, our students and the school have thrived. Ann has done so much: Greeting students by name at the door, attending to the business needs of the school, addressing parents' questions, meeting with supporters, setting timetables, working with Faculty and Staff, relating with the Board, nurturing the mission and vision of the school, and managing a very tricky year related to the COVID-19 pandemic. Ann's work with us has been phenomenal. We will miss Ann so much.

There will be time for gratitude and formal farewells in the months to come. In the meantime, we are grateful for Ann's ongoing commitment to the school through to the end of 2021. Ann wrote in her resignation letter:

"Please be assured my energy and passion for Rockway will continue over the next nine months. Rockway's financial picture, while healthy, is fragile in the ongoing pandemic context; enrollment continues to look promising despite the challenges of these uncertain times; we're grateful for the continued support of donors and the engagement of Alumni; academic and extra-curricular activities are thriving; faculty and staff are committed to Rockway's mission, vision and values; parents and students are engaged, and Rockway's Board of Directors remains strong and dedicated. I believe Rockway is in a good place and our current strategic planning will enable the school to continue to be sustainable."

The Board has struck a committee to coordinate the search for a new Rockway Principal. The committee is taking time to develop the posting for this position. We anticipate that the position will be posted in April 2021. Stay tuned to www.rockway.ca for updates — we hope to have the incoming Principal appointed by mid-September 2021 to overlap with Ann for a few months, and officially start January 1, 2022.

Thank you for your ongoing support for our school. The Board and I look forward to this year with Ann's leadership and commitment to the school. And we value your ongoing prayers and goodwill as we plan for a new Principal for our school.
