Faculty and staff quickly got to work, with the support of our community. Shortly after March Break, faculty began classes and supporting students online. Staff began working remotely to take care of the school and plan ahead. We have since surveyed students and families to update our online learning.



Faculty have modified all of their lesson plans for online classes, in addition to learning to navigate lots of new technology.

It is definitely not school as usual!

Students are without classrooms,

their daily routines, extracurricular activities, and are unable to be with their school community. They have also had to learn how to study from home. There are the practical challenges of Wi-Fi and computer equipment (Rockway has made Chromebooks available). And there are the emotional challenges of feeling overwhelmed and stressed—sometimes it's hard just to show up (faculty have reached out to students individually and our Resource team is providing extra support where needed).

It has been a steep learning curve for faculty and students, but together with parents, they are figuring out the challenges of our new virtual reality:

"I had an online video chat with my Grade 9 Computer class. In the end, EVERYONE showed up and was on the call (one student was missing at first, but another student phoned him to remind him to sign on). We were in our Ethics unit, and the class proceeded to have an incredibly thoughtful and mature discussion for AN HOUR about several complex ethical dilemmas, with everyone participating at some point." ~ Aaron Balzer, Education Assistant

As we approach the end of the schoolyear, Rockway's priority remains to take care of students and provide them with the best possible education. Faculty and staff are planning for all teaching scenarios this fall; classroom learning, online distance learning or a combination of both. We are moving ahead with a **Rockway COVID-19 Response** plan that includes adding video conferencing capability to classrooms to allow us to transition smoothly between teaching scenarios. In the meantime, we will celebrate a very special 're-imagined' Grade 8 Graduation in June. Later in the month we will mark Grade 12 students' important rite of passage, with their formal graduation ceremonies taking place at a later date.

When asked what they would say to encourage a classmate who had a hard week, one student replied: "Stay positive and never give up even if you find something difficult. Life isn't always going to be easy and we need to learn how to encounter challenges in order to make ourselves stronger!"

SUPPORTING FAITH, EDUCATION AND DIVERSITY

Seventy-five years ago on February 15, 1945, delegates of the Mennonite Conference of Ontario (now part of Mennonite Church Eastern Canada) approved the creation of a Mennonite high school in Kitchener. At Rockway's Founders' Day Chapel, David Martin, Executive Minister, MCEC, announced a grant of \$250,000 to the school on behalf of MCEC's member congregations. It builds on their earlier Diversity grant to Rockway.

Previously, Mary Groh, '49, and daughter of Rockway's first Principal, Harold Groh, had inspired MCEC to respond to her support with the Diversity Grant for tuition assistance for students from new Canadian MCEC congregations. This collaboration led to several young people being able to study at Rockway.

MCEC's latest grant will fulfill the promise of a Rockway education to these students, enabling them to complete their highschool studies. Any remaining grant funds will provide tuition assistance for future students.



Inspired by Mary and MCEC's grant, Rockway has launched a year-long fundraising campaign, 75 candles FOR 75 YEARS, to raise an additional \$270,000 in tuition assistance for students from MCEC congregations, who are facing financial barriers to studying at Rockway.

100% of donations are invested in a special

fund and will be withdrawn as needed. Each candle represents the average amount of annual tuition assistance awarded per eligible MCEC student (\$3,600). WILLIAM 'BILL' KRUGER: REMEMBERING A PASSIONATE ADVOCATE FOR MENNONITE EDUCATION


On January 7, 2020, William 'Bill' Kruger, former Rockway Principal (1972-82, 1983-89) passed away. Bill was a tireless and ardent advocate for Mennonite education. As a lifelong educator and pastor, he served in Mennonite communities in Alberta, Saskatchewan, Manitoba and Ontario. He was equally devoted to his wife, Helen, and their family, and 'was known and loved for his abilities to connect with anyone, to mentor and inspire, to hold an audience for long theological and historical talks, to playfully lighten the mood, to sing in a beautiful operatic tenor voice, and so much more...' Bill's legacy will live on. Donations received in his honour are designated to the William Kruger Scholarship Award for leadership and excellence in music.

SERVING IN A COVID-19 HOTSPOT

Today, Zac Wikerd, 2006, is working in New York City as a medicine fellow specializing in Gerontology at a large hospital. He has been sharing his experience in written updates that are both frightening and uplifting.

Update #1: "My initial impression was how tense the hospital was. Everyone is walking on egg-shells waiting for the surge. It appears that on Friday, we have hit the surge phase."

Next Zac describes how the entire hospital was transformed to care for the influx of Coronavirus patients. Some weeks, as many as 80% of his patients were suffering from COVID-19.

Update #2: "This week has been one of the most emotionally challenging weeks I've experienced in my training. My residency elsewhere prepared me well for the long hours and patient volume associated with a pandemic, but the emotional toll this virus has placed on us as physicians is new territory. I find the majority of my day is spent speaking with families back to back and mapping out what is important in the context of this aggressive, and likely deadly virus. Unfortunately, my patient population has been hit hard..."

After the first death in their geriatric practice, the team of Geriatricians did a team check-in as part of their selfcare. Zac reflected: "As Geriatricians, we make peace with death. We strive to help our patients live out their best lives, and when the time comes, die with dignity..."

Zac's update also shows his awe and regard for the efforts undertaken by his health care professional colleagues to quickly adapt, learn and serve in the face of 'daily changes'.

Update #3: "A third week has passed. Thankfully, I will be rotating off Inpatient Service. Quite honestly I've reached my emotional limit. Although I love hospital medicine, the Geriatric Service has mostly become a Palliative Service."

Through it all two things stand out in Zac's reflections. He is constantly striving to build his knowledge of the Coronavirus and decipher how it presents in his patients.

And he remains grateful. He is grateful for: his mom and friends making facemasks; the surprise delivery of cake and a home cooked meal; and, the kind thoughts and words of encouragement from many. To this, Rockway adds our own words of gratitude. Thank you, Zac. Be well.

ENVIRATHON SERVATHON 2020: 'BEE' WELL AND SHARE SOME GOOD



ROGER STOVER: GUIDED BY FAITH ON AND OFF THE COURT



Roger Stover, former Rockway Athletics Director and beloved teacher and coach, passed away on Thursday, May 7, 2020.

He taught at Rockway for thirty years and was known for his gentle, kind spirit by all who knew him.

Hired in 1968, Roger founded Rockway's Athletics program. He brought out the best in all athletes, generating team spirit, with his unique ability to bridge faith and sport.

"I had Roger as a teacher, coach, and peer. He was always patient with me as a student. He was always more concerned with big picture issues than with the smaller day-to-day things. We always knew he cared

deeply for us as people first and athletes second. I will never forget one experience at OFSAA. He cracked open his briefcase, and there, beside his To Do clipboard, was his Bible. It struck me as to how important his faith was to his actions, taking the time for Bible study at an OFSAA tournament. That image has stayed with me.
