### **FINDING A WAY FORWARD**

We look with optimism to the fall and the new school year. We are embracing the opportunity for renewal along with our 2021-2022 Chapel theme: *Love Does No Harm.* 

This theme is based on the scripture: Romans 13:9b-10a, "The commandments...are summed up in this one command: 'Love your neighbour as yourself.' Love does no harm to a neighbour."

What does it mean to love our neighbour as ourselves? To do no harm? These questions invite us to explore the various ways harm has been caused, sometimes under the guise of faith. By listening, we can begin to understand this harm. We can respond with humility to repair that harm and learn to live equitably with all. Our Chapel theme also gives context to the many Rockway community-building activities.

In keeping with Rockway's Mennonite faith, values and focus on peace and social justice, we will continue to explore questions of diversity and inclusivity throughout the coming year, advocating, *Love Does No Harm.* 

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### **ACADEMIC PLAN 2021-2022: SAFETY AND RENEWAL**

As we continue to navigate the pandemic, we are maintaining Rockway's *Academic Plan* Guiding Principles: **Safety, Academic Integrity and Community.** These align with Rockway's mission, vision and values.

We know that the Rockway student experience is a crucial part of why students are deeply connected to this school. We are committed to bringing back cherished activities and rich experiences for students, and the Rockway community, as soon as it is safe to do so.

Our Academic Plan is a starting point from which we can carefully plan ahead to reignite our beloved Rockway programs. We anticipate starting the year in the safety of cohorts, but with a detailed and flexible roadmap to transition to a non-cohorting schedule. Students will have a nine credit timetable: two quadmesters scheduled from September 2021 – January 2022 and one semester scheduled from February – June 2022.

This plan allows Grades 7-10 (who remain in the same classes/cohorts throughout the year) to have in-person learning for all classes. Upper grades will return to *all classes in-person* as soon as possible, along with the addition of a third elective.

Students in Grades 11 and 12 will have the opportunity to take instrumental and/or choral music in Period 5 (they can accumulate either an additional ½ credit or full credit). Jeff Enns will join our faculty teaching Strings and Vocal Music. He has been a private music instructor at Rockway and the Beckett School for many years. In addition to currently being a Cohort Counsellor at Rockway, he is also the organist and choir director at the Church of the Holy Saviour in Waterloo.

Jeff will work with fellow Music teacher, Eric Dettweiler, Rockway's Brass and Winds Specialist, and teacher, Elizabeth Lepock, who will be providing administrative support. Together they will be re-imagining Rockway's Music program. We look forward to music returning to our halls, and hopefully sharing some music with our community too!

Opportunities for Music, Design & Technology, Visual Arts and Family
Studies will also continue to be offered for Grade 7 & 8 students
throughout the year. Student clubs will meet online or outdoors (until able to meet indoors), and we are in conversation with District 8 regarding the Athletics program for 2021-2022 – hopefully, sooner than later!

Cohort Connections (a time designated to building relationships and creating community) will happen on a weekly basis during quadmesters. Weekly Chapels will be online at first, becoming in-person gatherings as soon as it is safe to do so.

We are prepared and eager to accelerate elements of this plan if or when Public Health and/or provincial restrictions allow us to do so. For example, we are adding two portables to have the space to accommodate students in Grades 11 and 12 as soon as they are allowed to mix across classes/cohorts and return to full, in-person learning for all of their courses.





### UNMUTING THE TOPIC OF UNHEALTHY RELATIONSHIPS

Rockway's Grade 11 Human Behaviour class was joined online by Kimberlee Walker (seen below) from Canadian touring theatre company, **Theatre of the Beat**, in early June for an interactive workshop based on their drama, "<u>Unmute: The Impact of a Pandemic on Gender-Based Violence</u>". This workshop was in a virtual format, and pairs with the <u>Unmute Podcast</u>, which can (but does not need to be) listened to in advance.

Theatre of the Beat leverages the power of applied theatre workshops to empower ordinary young people to support others who may be experiencing unhealthy relationship patterns. Since the highest rates of domestic violence occur between the ages of 18-25, this workshop was developed specifically for youth and young adults who may know (or be) victims, perpetrators, or bystanders to unhealthy relationships.

"The workshop was informative and relevant. We learned about healthy and unhealthy relationships and discussed different ways one of the teenage girls in the play could have intervened to help her friend.

Kimberlee introduced us to the idea of 'forum theatre' and the students impressed us with their willingness to do some role-playing. We divided into two groups, each group was given a scenario to act out, and the groups spent just a few minutes in break-out rooms preparing. When they came

back together as a whole, we acted out the scenes and members of the other group had a chance to shout "stop" and jump in with some alternative options for responses.

It's definitely more difficult to promote interaction over Zoom, but Kimberlee did a great job of drawing people in. She immediately set a warm and encouraging tone that put students at ease. Kimberlee created a safe environment by letting students know they could leave (and send the teacher a note) if the subject matter was getting too heavy or too close to home."





### staying hopeful creating safe spaces

Shortly before the pandemic restrictions of April 2021, which saw Rockway move again to *eRockway Learning*, two Rockway families — the McIntosh/Rai and Loberto — came forward to create safer spaces for students.

Specifically, they introduced us to "Austin", a HEPA-air filtration unit that is improving air circulation and air quality in a number of classrooms and spaces.

Thanks to these families, we are half way to meeting the needs identified in an air quality assessment report that called for 12

classrooms and spaces to have "Austins". The two families are hopeful that Rockway parents and community will donate the remaining \$4,300 to bring six more "Austins" to Rockway in time for the fall.
