Many new things are unfolding and life at Rockway continues to be vibrant as we also experience newness in events that are returning.



Rockway is excited about the return of our All-School Musical - the first in six years - with rehearsals currently underway. A great number of students will be involved in different aspects of Rockway's production of FROZEN JR. planned for June 7-10, 2023. Rockway's Senior Choir made its first church visit post-pandemic on February 26 to Breslau Mennonite Church and just returned from their trip to MSC (Mennonite Schools Council) Choral Festival in Chambersburg, Pennsylvania in April, the first inperson festival since 2019.

I look forward to June as this will also be a new season for me, with plans underway for the 2023 Grade 12 Graduation, complete with Rockway's traditional grad banquet following the afternoon ceremony.

#### **BLACK HISTORY MONTH AT ROCKWAY**

We began the planning for Black History month by inviting our current Black students to participate in conversations about what a successful Black History Month would look like to them. Based on their feedback, we began creating several different components of engagement. We were fortunate to kick-off Black History month by listening to Nick Aboagye who is a second year student at the University of Waterloo in the Honours Arts (Co-op) program. He challenged us to think more broadly about racism and to consider racism as a structural factor in society that is more pervasive than simply a targeted comment.





Throughout the month, classes watched one video each day that was part of a series of videos called 28 Moments in Black Canadian History.

These short videos introduced us to current Black Canadians and

their lived experiences in Canada as well as an historic Black Canadian or historical event that involved Black Canadians. Our students remarked that many of these historical moments were unfamiliar to them which lead to conversations around why certain voices and perspectives have been left out of traditional historical accounts. These daily videos and conversations helped us to have on-going and sustained conversations about anti-Black racism. They also helped us to think about how we work to create more equitable spaces for Black members of our community.

The month concluded with a chapel led by local racial justice advocate, Janis Juma. She challenged us to think beyond Black History Month by promoting Black flourishing throughout the year. The work of racial justice cannot be confined to one month of the year and Janis' message was an important call for our school community to commit to the on-going engagement that is necessary to create safe places for everyone here at Rockway. With much work still to be done, we are excited about the ways in which this year's Black History month will help us to continue to live out our values here at Rockway.



Guest speaker, Nick Aboagye, shared with us in Chapel to open Black History Month.



#### **FOOD DRIVE**

This past December, students participated in the Food Drive campaign to raise funds for House of Friendship's Christmas Food Hamper Program. Student Council challenged the school community to help raise \$25,000 using many events, including a polar plunge, to incentivize. Rockway students were more than up to the challenge and raised an astounding \$31,412! On February 6 (when the weather was finally cold enough!), volunteers from Student Council, faculty and staff braved the cold and took a very chilly bath.

#### **ATHLETICS HIGHLIGHTS**

**Volleyball** — Back in November, the Sr. Boys' Volleyball team finished their incredible season with a silver medal in a hard-fought battle in the OFSAA finals. In February, Rockway hosted the CWOSSA Girls' "A" Volleyball Championships. The Junior Rockway team thrilled the hometown crowd by winning the championship in three sets against Valley Heights.

Alpine — Despite some challenging weather and snow conditions, Rockway's Alpine ski team had a great season! Although two of their races were cancelled due to freezing rain, the team performed incredibly well at the CWOSSA race coming home with three medals: Elek Katona; bronze, Suri Schmidt; bronze, and Morgen Schmidt; gold. Morgen made Rockway history by qualifying for OFSAA Alpine. She made Rockway proud placing in the top third of the Giant Slalom race.

#### **ROCKWAY ROBOTICS**

After an off-season filled with learning and skill building, the competition season for Rockway Robotics began in early January with the release of this year's game. After nine intense weeks of designing, building, coding and testing, the team played in two back-to-back district qualification events, gaining enough points to earn a spot at the provincial championship. While the finish at provincials may have been lower than the team had hoped for, the dedication, enthusiasm and support they showed to their team members as well as other teams throughout the season is commendable.

#### **THINK PROJECT**

In a sobering March chapel, students were confronted with our complicated relationship with plastic and the legacy we are leaving behind. As part of the chapel, students were shown the video, Hate Myself for Loving You, which was recorded and filmed on location and

features a number of Rockway musicians. The video's THINK set was welded by Rockway alumna *Ellery Ezekiel '22* and was stuffed with plastic bottles by our grade 7 & 8 classes. One remarkable reality is that the solid steel structure will biodegrade hundreds of years before the plastic bottles inside.

The THINK set was moved to THEMUSEUM in downtown Kitchener where it was on display for the month of April. From there it will move to 50 Kent and then to the New Hamburg Relief Sale.

#### **ROCKWAY AT THE ONTARIO ETHICS BOWL**

This year Rockway entered the Ontario Ethics Bowl (OEB) for the first time. The league was established by the Department of Philosophy at the University of Toronto Mississauga in 2019 as a way to engage high school students in ethical reflection, philosophical dialogue and collaborative conversations about important issues. Through a set of case studies, Ethics Bowl encourages students to develop thoughtful and informed responses to important ethical questions. Participants work cooperatively within their own teams and with teams from other schools as they wrestle with big ideas and their implications.

Rockway entered two teams in this year's OEB: Kant Stop, Won't Stop (named in honour of the moral philosopher Immanuel Kant) and Bend it Like Bentham (named in honour of utilitarianism's founder Jeremy

Bentham). After competing in several exhibition matches over the fall, both teams entered February's Virtual Qualifier with 81 other teams from across the province. Both teams placed in the Top 30, which was a great result. Better still, *Kant Stop, Won't Stop* ranked 15th, and qualified for the Provincial Championships held at the University of Toronto Mississauga in early March.

Despite a strong performance at provincials, where *Kant Stop, Won't Stop* did exceptionally well, the team did not advance to the final round. Judges commented on the teams' skill at responding thoughtfully to other teams' presentations and at thinking on their feet. A Grade 12 student on our team, reflected on the value of the Ethics Bowl experience: "I really liked the way the format encouraged us to think collaboratively and work with other teams. Traditional debate encourages a certain combativeness but this forces us to work with others and to think more carefully about significant issues."

Rockway is grateful to Dr. Allison Murray, the teacher-coach who brought this rich opportunity to our students. Bravo! Plans are already underway to make our second season in OEB even better!




#### **FOUNDERS' DAY 2023**


