Decades later, these individuals have given selflessly to our community and contributed to the success and growth of hundreds of students. We are saddened to see them leave, yet excited for them and their next adventures.

The day started with a very special **Founders' Day Chapel** featuring guest speaker and Rockway alumnus, **Marcus Scholtes '02**. Marcus is an active violinist, pianist and conductor, based in Toronto. Most recently, he was named Co-Artistic Director of the Toronto Concert Orchestra. In addition to this, he serves as Associate Concertmaster of Sinfonia Toronto. Marcus shared stories from his time at Rockway, discussed the impact Rockway had on his life and then demonstrated his immense talent with performances on both piano and violin. Roger, a teacher at Rockway from 1968-1998, established the

The stands were packed as the crowd cheered on the teams. Both games were closely contested but, in the end, our Alumni defeated the Senior Boys' Basketball team and our Senior Girls' Volleyball team defeated our Alumnae. What an exciting way to end our day of celebration.

I graduated from Rockway in 2011. In my final year, I participated in a learning tour in Guatemala through Rockway's partnership with Mennonite Central Committee (MCC). Because of what I learned on this trip, I was inspired to study Agricultural Sciences and International Development Studies in the Arts and Sciences program at the University of Guelph.


In my undergraduate classes, we studied lots of examples of "development gone wrong", but we also studied positive examples of development and MCC appeared among them. By the time I graduated in 2016, I was ready to gain some meaningful experience working in community development, so I decided to participate in MCC's Serving and Learning Together program. From 2017-2018, I lived in Korba, Chhattisgarh, India working with an MCC partner in rural development and living with a local Mennonite family.

Returning to Canada, I completed a Masters in Public Health and Health Systems at the University of Waterloo, studying youth livelihood decision-making in rural Honduras. This research opportunity allowed me to learn Spanish (I studied in Guatemala!) and to develop program evaluation skills, which set me up for my current role as the Planning, Monitoring, Evaluating and Reporting Coordinator for MCC Guatemala-El Salvador. I started that role in 2021, 10 years after I had first visited Guatemala with Rockway.

Looking back, I see so many moments where God guided my steps and prepared me for what was coming next. In particular, as I write this from my apartment in Guatemala City, I'm smiling about how that high school trip with Rockway planted a seed that went on to shape my life and career so significantly.

1958: How do I, an Amish-Mennonite farm boy, jump from the familiar pond of a two-room public school to the amorphous big pond beyond? This shy, quiet, sometimes studious lad found Rockway (Class of 1961) foundational, expansive, faith-forming; a vital link to all that followed. Right as rain: fine, hunky dory, tickety-boo.

1961: Loretta Martin wrote our class poem, ending, "Now as we leave these well-known halls, / And finally close the door, / We do not end, but just begin / To see new heights to soar."

Board chair Norman H. High wrote: "May God's blessing attend your future learning—for continue to learn you must—or die spiritually and intellectually."

1961-2024: Tall orders, Loretta, and Norman. Right on. My life has included further education, vocation as a writer-editor among non-profit agencies, and avocation of reading, travel, photography, volunteering, walking, blogging and occasional cooking.

Current: Marty (Mishler) and I live at Greencroft Goshen (Indiana) Continuing Care Retirement Community. In May, we celebrate 51 years of marriage.
