THE LIBRARY: THE PLACE WHERE PEOPLE MEET

The goal of a school library is to create a physical and digital space that is open and accessible to all where reading, inquiry, research and creativity are central to students' educational, personal, social and cultural growth. We strive to create a space where students feel welcome, comfortable and safe, and hope to instill in them an understanding that, while libraries may be predominantly focused around books and information, they are also places to relax and make community connections. It is our hope that Rockway students take that understanding with them when they leave

this place and seek out their local library when they need it throughout their lives.

To create this welcoming environment, we have to sometimes flip the traditional idea of a library on its head. Gone are the days of the shushing librarian. The school library is a place where students can share ideas, work together on homework and projects, and build connections with each other. We regularly have students working out problems, brainstorming on the whiteboards and collaborating on schoolwork in the library. We also provide activities for students when they don't have any school work to complete or when they need a break. This past year, those activities included a puzzle table and colouring pages and this year expanded to include board games and crafts.

To make searching for books easier, we broke the fiction collection into adult and teen/young adult sections so that students can choose the level that suits them. From there, we classified each book into a genre, whether fantasy, mystery, romance... the list goes on. If a student is browsing the library and they know they like fantasy stories, they only have to browse through one or two sections rather than the entire collection to find a book. This will hopefully make the process of selecting books less overwhelming. While our non-fiction collection organization hasn't changed, we are exploring how

to make browsing information books more accessible. Our students also have access to our online databases, both at school and at home, which gives them access to highquality information for research projects.

When most of us think back on our elementary and high school experiences, we can likely remember trips to the school library. Whether it was finding a favourite picture book in elementary school, using the reference collection for research, or studying for exams, the library played a role in our education. In a time where school libraries are constantly underfunded and understaffed, Rockway students are blessed to have a school that continues to value the school library and the role it plays in our students' education.

WELCOME CHRISTMAS

This year, our Christmas concert returned to being held at Rockway. With over 200 of our 280 students in music, we have outgrown church spaces. Gyms ABC were transformed into a festive concert hall with decorative wreaths, black backdrops and several trees throughout the gym.

Our grade 7 & 8 choir opened the concert and brought smiles to our audience as they joyfully sang, *Welcome Christmas*. The evening continued with the rest of our choirs and musical ensembles inviting us to celebrate the



beauty of the season, demonstrating the depth of talent in our school. One of many highlights was a quintet of grade 10 students who sang Pentatonix's arrangement of *That's Christmas To Me*.



Our students were not the only ones who shared their musical skills that evening. Faculty and staff joined in as well. Josh Hill and Stacey VanderMeer accompanied the choirs in several pieces and a number joined with the students as part of the instrumental ensemble, Rockway Rhapsody. Rockway is so blessed to have such engagement and talent.

In his Christmas message, Rockway's principal, Josh Hill, reminded us to prioritize human connection this season.

ALUMNI UPDATES


